Ross-CASE Survey: the Annual Survey of Gifts and Costs of Voluntary Giving to HE in the UK – completion deadline: 23 November 2011

In the year 2000 an ad hoc group of Vice-Chancellors, recognising the need for comparative data to help guide decisions on fundraising policies, initiated a survey of gift revenue and fundraising costs. This survey has now expanded to cover most of the HE sector and many FE institutions and provides the most authoritative picture of fundraising activity and performance in the UK. We are writing to ask you to take part in this year's survey, which covers the 2010-11 financial year.

You will be aware that the HEFCW Matched Funding Scheme for Voluntary Giving commenced on 1 August 2009. Up to £10M will be provided over three years to matched funds raised by Welsh Universities. Completion of the Ross-CASE survey is mandatory for those Welsh institutions who are eligible and wish to participate in the matched-funding scheme. This is because HEFCW recognises the value of the information that this survey uniquely provides.

All information about completing the survey is available at <http://www.rosscasesurvey.org.uk>. The survey is completed electronically and is available until 23 November 2011. Please note this key deadline as HEFCW have indicated that completion of the survey is a condition of participation in the scheme.

As in previous years, The National Centre for Social Research (NatCen) is administering the survey on behalf of The Ross Group of Development Directors and Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE). NatCen are responsible for the survey administration and reporting, as well as providing benchmarking data to participating institutions, and facilitating the optional confidential data sharing.

If your institution has taken part previously, you will be familiar with what is involved. If you have not, we hope you will consider completing it this year.

There is a consistent national need for this kind of data. It is the only way we can accurately monitor the long-term health of philanthropic funding in the Higher Education sector. It also enables us to make visible the efforts universities are making to secure more voluntary income. It is therefore extremely important that as many institutions take part as possible.

Participation in the survey will also directly benefit your organisation. All participants receive an electronic copy of the findings and published report (if you have not already seen it, the 2009-10 report is already available at the survey website). Further, all participating institutions are entitled to request private benchmarking reports of the aggregate income and costs data for similar institutions. Institutions that took part in the 2009-10 survey may now


apply for a benchmarking report on the survey website, which will be provided free of charge. Sixty-three institutions have already received their reports, including five in Wales.

An exciting development in the survey last year, which is being repeated this year for survey participants, is the opportunity for your institution to join others who agree to share their survey returns on a confidential basis. Last year 83 institutions (including three in Wales) did so and are now able to analyse in detail their performance against the other 82 institutions.

You may be interested to know about how the data will be used by NatCen, the Ross Group and CASE. The published report of the survey will show aggregated results for the UK, plus broad institution-type categories such as Mission Groups. Disaggregated data for individual institutions will have more limited circulation to the Ross Group members responsible for overseeing the survey and (for Welsh institutions only) to HEFCW and possibly the Welsh Assembly Government. Full details are given in the Data Release Protocol on the survey website. Please note that if a university participates in the matched funding scheme, the Welsh Assembly Government then has license to publish resulting income (but not cost) figures for that university, should it choose to do so.
